Visionarium: the Path to a Greener University

To begin with, the climate strategy of the University of Copenhagen was launched with pomp and circumstance in the Ceremonial Hall. In the evening, the Union of Natural Resources Students held a so-called "visionarium" under the heading "The Path to a Greener University". In spite of the humble surroundings, there was still plenty of room for conceiving new ideas.

The event was the first under the auspices of the newly established umbrella organisation Grønt Netværk (Green Network). The purpose of the event was to establish contacts between students from all faculties and all study programmes as well as to create inspiration for a common environmental policy for all students at the University.

After the event, Betina Hansen from the Union of Natural Resources Students said that she was impressed with the wealth of ideas and the commitment shown by all participants.

The heat is on – massive climate efforts

Copenhagen will be hosting the UN's climate summit in November 2009, and in this context the University of Copenhagen is preparing for massive climate efforts. As the largest knowledge workplace in the country, we should all feel obliged to make an effort for the climate. This was one of the conclusions of a climate symposium held at the University last Monday. The Rector's Office kick-started the climate efforts with a three-in-one model: The climate must be put on the agenda in the area of R&D, education and, perhaps the most difficult of all, reducing our own CO₂ emissions.

Before the UN summit, the University of Copenhagen will organise a climate research conference in March 2009. The conference will provide politicians with some idea of how much we know about the climate today and thus helping governments around the world make more competent decisions at the negotiation table.

Speakers at the symposium were Rector Ralf Hemmingsen, Professor Ole Wæver, Department of Political Science, Pro-dean Katherine Richardson, Faculty of Science, Casper Mølck, Grønt Netværk (Green Network) and Pro-rector Lykke Friis chaired the symposium.

LIFE among the best in Denmark on new hit list

An innovative project involving Jan Salomonsen from the Department of Veterinary Pathobiology takes fifth place on a new list of the most cited research articles in the world, where several Danish scientists are among the authors.



The high ranking was achieved in open competition with, e.g., natural science and health science and is therefore quite remarkable. The frequently cited article is the result of a collaboration project entitled International Chicken Genome Sequencing Consortium. The project was the first to identify the genomic sequence in birds and thus fills a large gap in our knowledge of genetics. Because of the evolutionary position of the chicken between mammal and fish, understanding its genome is critical for improving our understanding of human biology. By comparing the genomes in a number of different animals, scientists can achieve a better understanding of human

genes and ultimately develop new strategies for improving health. "Of course all scientists dream of being a part of such a monumental work," says Jan Salomonsen.

The Danish Agency for Science, Technology and Innovation enters into partnership with Stanford University

On 1 October 2007, the Danish Agency for Science, Technology and Innovation entered into a partnership agreement with the Research Center for Human Sciences & Technologies Advanced Research Institute (H-STAR) at Stanford University.

Stanford University ranks second on the latest edition of Shanghai Jiao Tong University's list of the world's top 500 universities, only beaten by Harvard University. H-STAR comprises world-class Stanford scientists within, e.g., IT, communications, media, organisation and learning as well as industrial design.

"It is crucial for the quality of Danish research that Danish scientists have access to world-class research networks. The USA has some of the best universities in the world, and collaboration with universities like Stanford, UC Berkeley, Harvard and MIT is therefore a priority area for the government," says Inge Mærkedahl, Director General of the Danish Agency for Science, Technology and Innovation.

All Danish universities can make use of the partnership agreement which includes the holding of joint workshops, matchmaking between Danish scientists and scientists at Stanford University and, to begin with, a limited number of research stays for Danish scientists at Stanford.

"For Danish scientists, the partnership agreement with Stanford University serves as a stepping stone for high-level research. We hope that Danish universities will make use of this opportunity," says Inge Mærkedahl, Director General of the Danish Agency for Science, Technology and Innovation.

Professor Keith Devlin, Executive Director of H-STAR is in Denmark from 8 to 11 October to initiate the collaboration and to find specific possibilities for matchmaking Danish scientists with Stanford scientists.

Innovation Center Denmark in Silicon Valley has acted as the midwife for the agreement as part of the overall strategy for bridge-building between universities in Denmark and California. The agreement is thus in line with the government's globalisation strategy for enhancing the opportunities of Danish universities to participate in the research networks of foreign universities.

The Danish Minister for Science, Technology and Innovation, Helge Sander: Unique new research pool

The universities are now given the opportunity to land multiannual research grants for ambitious projects which can improve Danish research.

The initiative is a result of the government's globalisation strategy and discussions with different representatives of society in the Danish Globalisation Council. Approx. DKK 500 million has been earmarked for applications from universities which in open competition may be granted funds for special initiatives.

The pool of DKK 480 million has been given the straightforward name UNiversitetsforskningens InvesteringsKapital, abbreviated UNIK. Now universities, and not individual scientists, will be competing with each other for research funds. However, once appropriated, the funds can be spent freely by the universities.

The purpose is to promote world-class research initiatives. Universities can focus on both basic research and applied research and within all scientific disciplines. However, it must be promising Danish research, i.e. research with a potential for achieving groundbreaking results and for achieving elite status globally within the next few years.

The publication of the call for applications for UNIK on 15 October 2007 marks the beginning of the competition. There will be very large grants to compete for, e.g. DKK 80-100 million for a five-year research initiative. More specifically, the management of each individual university must prepare proposals for large research initiatives within areas which, from an academic point of view, are significant for each individual university and for Danish research.

The Danish Ministry of Science, Technology and Innovation will appoint an international expert panel to assess the applications received. The panel will be independent of the existing research council system so as to ensure the members' competence to act when assessing the applications. The panel will be composed of high-qualified, international scientists, and on the whole the panel will have academic breadth and competences within strategic planning and management at universities.

With the management reform and the mergers implemented in recent years, the universities are well prepared for solving major tasks within both research and education as well as the type of initiatives contemplated by the new research pool.

This year's record-breaking admission numbers at universities and more funding than ever for research and education in Denmark provide the universities with unique opportunities, but at the same time there is also an obligation to deliver in terms of university research and education of graduates and scientist of international standard.

The new DKK 500 million UNIK research pool will be a strong helping hand for universities planning ambitious initiatives that may lead to significant scientific breakthroughs.

From 25 to 27 June 2008, the Swedish Research Council, together with Malmö University, the Øresund University, the University of Lund and Danish Science Communication – the latter being funded by the Danish Agency for Science, Technology and Innovation – will be hosting the global PCST (Public Communication of Science and Technology) conference.

The conference is held biannually, each time on a new continent – in 2006 in Seoul, Korea, in 2004 in Barcelona, in 2002 in Cape Town etc. This is the first time the conference is held in Scandinavia. The main conference will be held in Malmö, but Copenhagen will be hosting one afternoon at, among other places, CBS.

PCST is a network comprising both practitioners and theorists within scientific communication. This composition as well as the fact that the participants come from all over the world give the conference a unique perspective.

It is, of course, important that we in Denmark seize this opportunity to show the world what we are capable of. The purpose of this email is thus to encourage both practitioners and theorists to submit proposals for papers.

Unfortunately, the deadline is short – already 31 October – but we hope that you and your colleagues are interested in the conference and want to submit proposals for papers.
